Most money given to support this service comes from Montgomeryshire, a need for rapid response from Welshpool and a need for rapid response in the Mid-Wales area due to poor road access and distance to hospitals.

REPORT FROM GARETH JONES COUNTY COUNCILLOR FOR

LLANFAIR CAEREINION AND LLANERFYL

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY



I was honoured to lay a wreath on behalf of Powys County Council during Llanfair's remembrance service. Congratulations to everyone involved in putting the service together it seems to be growing as an event each year. Congratulations also to all involved in the "Poppy waterfall" it looked spectacular.

LEISURE CENTRE

It was a huge shock when the phone call came to say Caereinion leisure centre would be closing for 3 months. After 4 days of opposing the decision, it was a relief when we finally had the press release that the cabinet had seen sense and reversed their decision. Can I thank everyone who contacted me with information on the centre's usage. I fear that in the new year Powys Council will be having conversations with Freedom about Leisure Centre efficiencies throughout Powys.

NEW HEALTH CENTRE

In last year's Christmas chronicle I reported that the "developer assures me they will be submitting a full application in the next few weeks" so frustrated that 12 months on and still the work has not begun. Having spoken again with the developer he says that "they have faced a number of challenges, but the project remains on course to be in a position to submit planning imminently"

MID AND WEST WALES FIRE SERVICE BRIEFING

I attended a presentation by the service. Currently there are 1300 staff, they cover 12000 km2, provide cover for 432,7991 households with a population of 913,217, inspect 40195 nondomestic premises including hospitals, schools, and care homes. There are 18 fire stations in Powys including the one here in Llanfair. Operational challenges include farm fires, river and flooding rescues, coastal rescues, hotel fires and road traffic accidents and terrorist incidents. They are currently facing a recruitment crisis and recruitment campaigns are ongoing if you know of anyone interested, in signing up please either contact myself or a member of Llanfair Fire Service.

COUNCIL TAX INCREASE ON EMPTY PROPERTIES

On 8 November the Cabinet resolved to increase the Council Tax payable on empty properties from a 50% uplift to 100% uplift. They agreed to recruit an Empty Property Officer to assist landlords in getting the properties back into the housing stock. There are currently over 4000 people waiting for a property in Powys.

We have only just started this and take up has been slow, but we hope that we can help people in our community by providing this when they need somewhere to come, not just to keep warm, but also to find people to spend time with.

We continue to be a collection point for Welshpool Foodbank. Donation can be left in the green chest on the back pew, in church.

As I write, Christmas is nearly here again, a very different time from the past two years. We are now able to welcome Ysgol Bro Caereinion Primary Phase for their Christingle and



have our more normal carol services and Christmas events. We are also filling the Church with stars in memory of loved ones or in celebration of something special. I hope you will all have made a star and visited the church to see them.

By the time you read this we will be into 2023, another new year with new opportunities. As I meet people around the town I often get asked about God and why my faith is important to me. It is always a privilege to share my story and have people interested in it. We seem to enjoy hearing other's stories and sharing in this way is a great way of connecting with each other. The Diocese has created a five-week course, 'Faith, Hope and Love', where there is an opportunity to watch some videos telling stories of God working in ordinary lives and then time to share our own stories. The course is bilingual, very interactive, friendly and informal with plenty of tea and coffee ... and cake! We are hoping to run the course during Lent 2023 so look out for details.

Poppy Waterfall Llanfair Caereinion

Back in October 2021, just as things were opening up and events were starting to happen, providing that social distancing and wearing of masks were adhered too, Llanfair Institute held a coffee morning, probably the first indoor community social event post-covid. During the morning Shirley Jones addressed the guests about a "Knit and Knatter" group that she had organised, they would gather on the 3rd Wednesday every month, anybody was allowed to participate and could knit whatever they wanted, as long as they "Knattered"!

Samantha Webster, Chair of Llanfair Caereinion and District Royal British Legion and ex-military, was one of the guests and immediately thought about an idea, a dream that she had had for some time but did not have the skill to do it, that was knit! Sam asked Shirley if the group would like to knit poppies to create a waterfall of poppies that would flow form a window of St Mary,s Church in Llanfair Caereinion, ready for the Poppy Appeal in 2022. Once the permission of Reverend Jane James had been sought of course.



At the next Knit and Knatter group meeting that is held in Llanfair Institute, Shirley put this to the group, and they agreed with great enthusiasm. Red and black wool was purchased, and the pattern was shared, wool and the pattern were also delivered to those that were vulnerable, with Covid still being an issue. PAVO, also supplied some wool which was really appreciated as you can imagine, they would need a lot of wool. The group also wanted to honour civilians and animals that also perished during the various wars and conflicts so it was then decided to knit white poppies in memory of civilians and purple for animals. By March 2022, we had bags full of red, white and purple poppies. Over 60 people of various ages were involved in this project, the youngest being 10 years old and the oldest being 90 years of age.

An old 4.5m by 9m Army camouflage net was purchased, hundreds of small red cable ties and the task was then to fix the poppies of all different sizes and shades of red to the net. A smaller net was purchased to display the purple and white poppies. This took approximately 60 hours, but the effect was amazing, as was witnessed when it was put in place on the 21st October at St Marys Church Llanfair Caereinion. Andrew Watkin Building Contractors Limited offered their Manitou and manpower, Gareth Chapman, Dylan Jones and Rowan Chapman all helped Alan Webster put up the net and poppies.

Children form Bro Caereinion Primary Phase came and sang beautifully in the church, with parents and family watching. A competition is ongoing to "guess how many poppies are on the waterfall", the prize is £50 cash, all proceeds will be split with the Poppy appeal and the Church Clock Repair.

This has exceeded what we all expected and we cannot thank the Knit and Knatter Group enough for all their hard work in knitting poppies, also all those that were unable to be part of Knit and Knatter but sent poppies in to be included. We are hoping to have the Waterfall from the top of the tower next year, so if anybody would like to knit some poppies, please do get in touch, wool will be supplied.

Knit and Natter will be held on January 18th and February 15^{th.}

Anglo Welsh

I have lived in Llanfair Caereinion for 20 years now and I don't ever see myself heading "home", back to South East England.

It was a move that happened by accident after a weekend visit to this part of Wales back in Feb 2002. One trip was enough for me to take the plunge into moving, mainly down to the warm and friendly reception from the locals. I had the view that English people were disliked by everyone in Wales, and yet that one weekend changed that view in the blink of an eye and 6 months later I had moved into a new life, town and community.

This is where my love of local grassroots football really took off. Yes, I could jump on a train from Welshpool and support Shrewsbury, or I could drive to Wrexham and support my nearest professional Welsh side, or even take the short drive to watch TNS in the league of Wales who were at the time playing in Llansantffraid-ym-Mechain. That was always a non-starter for me. Who names a club after their own company?

In the end I opted for a 300 metre walk up the hill to watch Llanfair Utd and so started a connection to my local club that now spans just over 19 years. I have gone from just turning up to watch, to being pitch marker, linesman for reserves for 4 seasons; normally getting more grief from my own team than the opposition, tried to be fair and at some point, was also the fine collector for the club. How to make yourself popular (not). I have been on the committee for 15 years. At one time I was vice chairman, but I have now found the job I love being on the gate. You get to chat to away fans, ground hoppers and see regular home fans. The social side afterwards, where a group of us must go over the game in the local, is one of my Saturday highlights. The instructions from my other half are either come home early and in a tidy way or stay out late and sleep downstairs. Downstairs wins hands down! I missed these Saturdays during covid months and am pleased that they are now back.

I am now confused. I know I will never be Welsh as my accent gives away my birthplace, yet I love watching Wales play with friends that I have made through being involved with the local club and I have been to a few games in 2008 and 2009 when Wales were playing in Millennium Stadium.

I now have kids that were born in Wales and they are super proud of being Welsh, and that makes me proud of them.

So, my dilemma is this. Can you be an Anglo Welsh? Because I have found since moving here and joining in that I have become part a community that I don't think I would have found just outside London. Whenever I go "home" to see friends and family I find myself sticking up for Wales and arguing against the normal stereotypical jokes about sheep, rugby and rain, which until I moved, I am ashamed to say, I probably made the same stupid boneheaded remarks. I hope now that I have seen the light people who read this will forgive me.

Excerpt from the newsletter of Russell George

"I continue to push the Welsh Government to ensure that there is a formal consultation on the proposals to close Welshpool's Air Ambulance base. I raised this issue again in the Senedd last month. I was disappointed that the Minister replied suggesting that the Welsh Government's role in this process is limited.

Last week, I joined a range of politicians and campaigners in sending a joint letter to Stephen Harrhy, the Chief Ambulance Services Commissioner, posing a number of concerns before the planned public engagement begins. These concerns included issues around the modelling used in the proposals, around how data is shared with the public and claims we believe are inaccurate that 583 additional missions will be flown each year.

We secured a commitment to a public meeting in January which I will of course - share details of as soon as they are published. It is very important that all residents are able to share their thoughts and views on the proposals.

On Monday this week, I was invited by several local businesses, to meet with the Chair of Trustees, the Chief Executive and others from the Wales Air Ambulance Charity. We had a robust discussion about the future of the service and public feeling about the proposals. The charity's team were open, clear in their answers and responded transparently to our questions. The charity also stated that the proposal to re-configure the service, was not their proposal, and they were now also consultees in the process. Everyone attending agreed that it would be important for the public of Mid Wales to engage with the Commissioner's engagement process."




